products containing so much as a trace of animal parts. From 1989 until 1993 I did quite well, taking comfort in the fact that I had an extensive selection of protein dishes made with cheese-until the day I picked up one of my back issues of Hinduism Today where, clearly stated, was the fact that ethical vegetarians are prohibited from consuming cheeses that are made with animal enzymes. Since all cheese products in restaurants and supermarkets are made with animal enzymes (rennet), I am now virtually with no choices when I dine out and when purchasing prepared food.

I was so grateful to Hinduism Today for alerting me to this unfortunate behavior on my part that I renewed my lapsed subscription for five years!

In appreciation for your "enlightenment" I'd like to make two suggestions that may be of interest to your readers. 1) Cheeses made with vegetable rennet may be purchased at most health food stores. Vegetable rennet itself may also be purchased for use in preparing one's own cheeses. 2) The "light butters" newly on the market contain gelatin which is, of course, an animal product.

Thank you for the knowledge imparted by this invaluable publication.
